



What did you eat this week? Did you drink some milk, put honey on your toast, or eat an apple? These foods and many more are grown on Island farms.




Honeybees

Bees help plants to grow by carrying pollen from one flower to another. Many of the crops farmers grow depend on the work of the bees.








Apples

Many varieties of apples are grown in orchards across PEI including Honey Crisp, a regional favourite!




Blueberries

PEI produces more than 34 million pounds of wild blueberries each year. Our province is the ideal location for wild blueberries to grow because of the level fields with very few rocks.




Strawberries

Cranberries have grown wild on PEI for centuries. Early settlers harvested them in the fall in order to add fruit to their diet.




Vegetables


Carrots

Carrots are the most popular vegetable crop grown on PEI. Our farmers sell their carrots to grocery stores off the Island, too!




Potatoes


Dairy Cows


The cows on dairy farms make milk. On PEI, the most common breed of dairy cows is the Holstein.



Beef Cows


Beef cattle are raised for their meat. Some breeds of local beef cattle are Simmental, Black Angus, Charolais and Belted Galloway.






Eggs

Island farmers produce more than 45 million eggs every year. Each laying hen can lay one egg a day and about 300 eggs each year.




Turkeys


A turkey is a type of poultry raised for meat. It's a tradition on PEI for families to enjoy a turkey dinner for Thanksgiving!
